1 Understand how this method works.
Pokémon generations 6 and 7 include games like X, Y, Sun, and Moon, all of which have been notoriously difficult to randomize. Luckily, you can use a randomizer called PK3DS and a tool called PackHack to randomize some aspects of these games. Unfortunately, the PK3DS randomizer is only available for Windows computers.
2 Make sure that you have an emulator and a ROM. You'll need an emulator that is capable of playing 3DS games, such as Citra, and you'll need a 3DS ROM for your preferred Pokémon game to go along with your emulator. You can find torrents for 3DS ROMs, but most popular ROM sites don't carry 3DS ROM files that can be downloaded directly. Citra is a popular choice for a 3DS emulator:
3 Download the PK3DS randomizer. This randomizer can support most games from Pokémon generation 6 and some games from generation 7:
4 Extract the PK3DS files. To do so:
Right-click the downloaded ZIP folder.
Click Extract All...
Click Extract
Double-click the pk3DS Build 337 ZIP folder.
Click Extract at the top of the window.
Click Extract at Click Extract when prompted.
5 Download and install Pack Hack. This program is necessary in order to save your 3DS ROM as a new, randomized version:
6 Open the PackHack folder. Double-click the extracted PackEnglishV12 folder, double-click the only folder inside, and then double-click PackHack.
7 Place your 3DS file inside of the PackHack folder. Copy the 3DS file by clicking it and pressing Ctrl+C, then press Ctrl+V while in the PackHack folder.
8 Double-click SetupUS. It's in the PackHack folder. Doing so will prompt the 3DS file to begin extracting.
9 Copy the entire folder's files. When the setup is done running, click one file, press Ctrl+A, and press Ctrl+C to copy everything that's in the PackHack folder.
10 Paste the files into a new folder. Create a new folder in the same place as the extracted PackEnglishV12 folder (e.g., the Desktop), open the new folder, and press Ctrl+V.
11 Open PD3DS. Double-click the pk3DS application file to do so. The PK3DS program window will open. If you see a pop-up window alerting you that PK3DS is an "unknown program", click More info, then click Run anyway at the bottom of the window.
12 Click File. It's in the top-left corner of the window. A drop-down menu will appear.
13 Click Open. You'll see this option in the drop-down menu.
14 Open the new folder that you just made. Double-click the new folder to do so.
15 Select your ROM. Click the 3DS game here.
16 Click OK or Open. Your selected ROM will open in the PK3DS emulator.

19 Copy the new folder's extracted ROM folder. Open the folder that you created, click the ExtractedRomFS folder, and press Ctrl+C.
20 Paste the file into the PackHack folder. Re-open the PackHack folder that's inside of the PackEnglishV12 folder, then press Ctrl+V and choose to replace the conflicting file name.
21 Double-click the HackingToolkit option. It's in the PackHack folder. This will open a Command Prompt window.
22 Rebuild the Pokémon 3DS file. Do the following in the Command Prompt window:[1]
Type d and press ↵ Enter
Type in a unique, one-word name (no spaces) for your Pokémon ROM, then press ↵ Enter. Press any key when prompted.

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Pokemon randomizers and Nuzlocke challenges have given the games an almost endless replay factor. First, players will need to download an Emulator. An Emulator is a PC application that acts as whatever console is chosen. Select whichever device plays the Pokemon game that will be played. This could be a Gameboy Color, Gameboy Advanced, or even a 3DS. Once an Emulator is downloaded, Pokemon players will need to find a ROM. Randomizing the game is the first step. Preparing for a Nuzlocke challenge is the second. Nuzlocke is a term used generally nowadays in regards to any variety of the Nuzlocke challenge. Of course, many still go the route of the original or change the "Nuz" portion to indicate what kind of "locke" challenge they will undergo. The rules of a Nuzlocke can make a randomized Pokemon playthrough interesting and frustrating all at the same time. Players can only catch the first Pokemon encountered on any Route or named location. I'm using mostly standard Nuzlocke rules:
1. May only catch the first Pokémon to appear along a route or area.
2. Must nickname all Pokémon.
3. Pokémon that faint may not be used again. I'll store mine in a grave box on the PC.
4. Trades between me and @introvertgay are allowed.— Shakespeare Gay (@ShakespeareGay) January 21, 2021
If a Pokémon faints, they are to be released or moved to a permanent box location. They are considered unusable at this point. If a battle is lost and a player blacks/whites out, the game is typically considered over and a failure. All of these rules are self-imposed. In order to add some fun to the challenge, try naming all the Pokémon or only use the same number of Pokemon as the next Gym Leader or Rival will use. Randomizing a Nuzlocke can be absolutely insane. Players could end up with a Legendary or Mythical or there could be less luck had and each Pokemon found is lesser and lesser. That's the beauty of a Nuzlocke and a randomized Pokemon experience. Edited by Joey Carr
Nuclockes are a great way to keep older Pokemon games new and exciting. The ruleset includes, but is not limited to, only catching the first Pokemon in each new area, nicknaming all caught Pokemon, and releasing them or boxing them once they faint. You can Nuzlocke pretty much any Pokemon game - even rom hacks - but many people like to return to old favourites they remember well and have a new go at them, so this guide will give some much-needed tips for how to beat Pokemon Platinum under the tough Nuzlocke conditions. Choose Chimchar A good piece of advice for most Nuzlocks is to pick the Fire-type starter. This is because Fire-types tend to be few and far between in most regions. The only real exception for this is Mudkip in a generation three Nuzlocke. But, for gen four, Chimchar is for sure the way to go. It's a fast mixed attacker and a great Fire/Fighting-type. It also evolves at level 14 making it dependable very early on. Other Fire-types in gen four take ages to find, so pick this fun little monkey up early to absolutely decimate Gardenia's Grass-type second gym. Remember the Physical/Special Split Unlike earlier generations, Gen 4 introduced the Physical/Special move split, a revolutionary and much-needed change that completely upended the games. Instead of moves being Physical or Special based on type, they now have an icon next to them that tells you what they are. This has made so many Pokemon far more viable, as it gives access to a much larger pool of useful STAB (same type attack bonus) moves. Plan For Static Encounters
Pokemon Platinum gives you a few free Pokemon, which is very nice of it. Just keep in mind where you're going to get them, as they may make other Pokemon unavailable. For example, you receive an egg on Iron Island. If you hatch this egg on a route, technically you can't catch any other Pokemon on that route, so try and hatch it in a city if you can, or a route that doesn't have any Pokemon you want on it. Also, make sure you get these static encounters. The list of static encounters you can get in Platinum and their requirements and locations are as follows:
Starter Pokemon on Route 201, no requirement
An Eevee from Bebe in Hearthome City, no requirement
A Porygon in Veilstone City from a man who lives behind the Pokemon Center, no requirement
A Togepi egg from Cynthia in Eterna City, you have to beat Jupiter in the Galactic building there.
A Drifloon at the Valley Windworks, you have to beat Mars there and return on a Friday to see the Pokemon.
Spiritomb can be found on route 209, you need to insert the Odd Keystone into the Hallowed Tower after speaking to people in the Underground 32 times, this can all be the same person.
Rotom can be found in the Old Chateau in Eterna Forest, the only requirements are you need Cut to get inside and you'll only find it at night.
Take Repels to stop other Pokem spawning and ruining the encounter location. You get a Riolu Egg from Riley on Iron Island, you just have to help him make it through and he'll give you the egg, make sure you have room in your party.
Catch A Magikarp This is probably the most common piece of advice given for any Nuzlocke, and that's for good reason. Magikarp are super common Pokemon that can be found in almost any body of water. As such, you can plan where to encounter one and even catch another if you lose one. Obviously, the splashing fish itself isn't any good, but Gyrados, the Pokemon it evolves into at level 20 is an absolute monster. It possesses the Intimidate ability which lowers the Attack stat of opposing Pokemon, a revolutionary and much-needed change that really helped this Pokemon out, as it now has access to STAB Physical Water-type moves such as Waterfall. It's also a great pivot for baiting Electric-type attacks before a switch to a Ground-type Pokemon. Don't Only Use Bidoof For HMs
Most people catch a Bidoof and use it for nothing but HMs. While it is an excellent HM user, it's also a pretty solid Pokemon to add to your team. It evolves into Bibarel at level 15, giving you a fully evolved Pokemon very early on, before Roark potentially. Bibarel's Water/Normal typing makes it very good offensively, as does its decent 85 base Attack stat. If you already have a Gyrados then there's no need for Bibarel, but it's a great Pokemon to use until you replace it. Just try using it for more than HMs and you'll be pleasantly surprised by how useful it is. Prepare For Valley Windworks
The fight with Mars at the end of the Valley Windworks is an absolute run-killer, especially if you're playing with hardcore rules that impose level caps on your Pokemon. It's as if Gamefreak decided to just throw a random Whitney at you. She has a level 15 Zubat with Toxic which can be a real problem, so get rid of it quickly. Her ace is a level 17 Purugly, a large cat that's deceptively fast, so be careful. It outspeeds every Pokemon you can normally acquire up until that point when capped at level 17, so it'll always go first. It has STAB Fake Out coming off an 82 Attack stat, so it's best to bring a Rock-type Pokemon to start the battle off. After that, it only has Scratch and Faint Attack, but both moves will hit you hard. You could stick with a Rock-type to prevent any STAB attacks, or use a Fighting-type to try and beat it quickly.
